The credit is nonrefundable, so the credit amount you receive can't exceed the amount you owe in tax. You can carry forward any excess unused credit, though, and apply it to reduce the tax you owe in ...

You can still receive the 30% credit on a solar-only system. However, if you install qualifying battery storage (at least 3 kWh capacity), it can also be included in the credit--if installed ...

For 20 years, homeowners could directly claim a federal tax credit for buying and installing solar panels on their property. That era ended when the "One Big Beautiful Bill" terminated the ...

As of 2025, the 30% Residential Clean Energy Credit remains fully available for qualifying solar installations.

Homeowners installing solar panels on their primary residence can claim up to 30% of the total project cost as a credit against federal income taxes. Businesses can also claim this credit for ...

Install your Solar Energy System by December 31, 2025! To ensure timely filing, you must install your solar system by the end of December 31 of the year you wish to claim the credit.

If you buy the panels with cash or finance them through a loan, the credit is yours. But if you go with a lease or a power purchase agreement, the installer keeps the credit.
